

### U.S. Bond Sales Show Good Gains

"U. S. Savings Bonds sales in Maricopa County amounted to \$287,051 last month," Volunteer County Savings Bonds Chairman Richard Burgess announced here today.

"Total sales within the state during the month are \$1,841,514," he reported. "Sales for the January through October period of this year are \$19,107,193 as compared with \$18,994,811 for the 10-month period last year.

"Nationally, cash sales of Series E and H Bonds amounted to \$369 million for October and the total value of Savings Bonds held by Americans has reached an all-time high of \$49 billion, 993 million.

"Savings Bonds as Christmas gifts will reflect on sales during the last two months of this year," the chairman said. "Many people are building a family tradition of giving Bonds during Christmas and birthdays to help finance college educations or for other worthwhile goals requiring planned saving.

"Free gift envelopes for Savings Bonds are available at your bank," he advised.

### Christmas Mailings Of 1964 Bigger Than Ever Before, More Efficient

"Post offices in the United States handled more mail last Christmas season than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history." Postmaster Fred J. Bolender told the Arizonan this week. Nationally, about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

"ZIP code use and the cooperation of the public in mailing early were the principal reason for this success. With the same or better cooperation this month, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush," he said.

Bolender had this advice which would help mailers prepare for this month's mailings:

Update last year's address list and include ZIP codes. The telephone directory is usually a good source for local addresses, except for rural routes. The ZIP code for Chandler addresses is 85224. For residents of Williams AFB it is 85225.

Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials, such as boxes, wrapping paper, etc.

Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved, or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise. He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards and packages as clearly as possible and that they make every attempt to mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit all their gifts and greetings.

### Spotlight On Seton

Advent, which is the four weeks of preparation for the coming of Christ, began this week.

The advent wreath has become a tradition at Seton High School. The student body participated in the blessing and lighting of the first candle of the wreath Monday, November 29, at the campus grotto. John Urban, Student Council President, officiated in the ceremonies. He first explained the meaning and symbolism of the wreath, and then blessed it. A member of the freshman class lit the first candle, as the custom is for the youngest of the family to light the first candle. "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" was sung, ending the ceremony.

The advent wreath has been a German practice for many centuries. Although the wreath itself has no direct liturgical significance, it is symbolic of Christ who is to come within four weeks.

The form of the wreath, a circle, is a symbol of eternity. The evergreens symbolize life and immutability of God, the purple candles and ribbons, penance; and the rose candle, the joy of the Gaudete Sunday. The number of candles, four, signifies the four weeks in Advent and the thousands of years that the world waited for the Redeemer.

This traditional practice will be held daily at noon throughout Advent at the grotto, where the wreath is placed.
